REFERRAL PROCESS (CON'T)

There are five steps involved in referring a family to IIS.

Step 1 Referring individual assesses the family to see if IIS would be appropriate.

Step 2 Referring individual discusses the IIS program with the family.

Step 3 The family must agree to participate in an IIS assessment.


